Nielsen Update

- The Nielsen retail sales data is available up to April 27th, 2019, and indicates
- that in the latest 4-week period 3.3 million dozen eggs were sold in Alberta; a
- 6.7% increase from the previous 4-week period (ending March 30th), and a 7.4%
 increase in sales compared to the same period in 2018.
- Nielsen retail sales in the last 52 weeks are up 5.0% over the previous 52 weeks in Alberta, to 41.2 million dozen eggs. Specialty eggs (excluding Omega-3) have seen the largest sales growth; a 5.0% increase over the previous 52 weeks, to 3.3 million dozen eggs (8.1% of the total eggs sold in Alberta).

Notice Regarding West Coast Reduction's Depopulation Services

West Coast Reduction Ltd. (WCRL) (formerly Northern Alberta Processors) has provided EFA with notice that they are phasing out their depopulation (MAC cart) service for farmers in Alberta. Effective December 31, 2019 WCRL will no longer provide spent hen euthanasia services. This decision was previously made in both BC and Saskatchewan. Euthanasia is not WCRL's core business or expertise.

WCRL will continue to provide collection and recycling of spent hens and will adjust their rates to reflect this change in service.

Farmers who have been using the services of WCRL for their depopulation should begin to consider alternative options for 2020 onwards.

Canadian Feather Pecking Management Plan - Project Update

EFA has been supporting the research project "Toward an understanding of beautiful feather cover in laying hens" led by Dr. Alexandra Harlander since 2016. This project explored feather cover and feather loss in Canadian laying hen flocks in non-conventional housing by collecting on-farm information. In 2017, over 50% of Alberta egg farmers operating furnished/free run systems submitted surveys to Dr. Harlander for this project.



Published articles in peer reviewed scientific journals are a common outcome of research projects. The paper, "An Investigation of Associations Between Management and Feather Damage in Canadian Laying Hens Housed in Furnished Cages" was recently published. The study estimated the prevalence of feather damage in furnished cages revealing that, on average, 22% of birds display moderate or severe feather damage due to feather pecking.

Factors found to have an influence on greater feather damage seen in flocks in furnished systems included:

- Having all brown-feathered hens
- The practice of midnight feeding
- Hens not having access to a scratching area or additional foraging material

The authors suggest that midnight feeding may contribute to feather damage in the following way:

"When midnight feeding is practiced it creates an environment where there is a mix of resting and active birds, likely increasing the chance of resting birds becoming victims of active birds performing [feather pecking] during that time."

New Entrant Preliminary ACP Audit

Historically, New Entrants have been subject to EFC's on-farm program audits during the first flock cycle, but not before the birds are 45 weeks of age, or approximately 6 months after production began. This timeframe allowed farmers to develop and maintain 6 months' worth of records prior to the audit.



During a recent review of the Annual On-Farm Audit Policy a concern was raised about the delay of the first ACP audit. Accordingly, the EFC Board of Directors has approved the immediate implementation of a New Entrant Preliminary ACP Audit that will occur approximately 4-8 weeks after production has begun. This will better ensure that the hens' welfare is not compromised at any time during the initial year of production.

The Audit will use the existing ACP checklist however, the corrective action requests will be for training purposes only. This audit will be an educational tool to ensure that the farmer is aware of the necessary records and requirements within the ACP. It will also allow the inspector to explain the intent of the ACP requirements and associated elements. If necessary, the inspector conducting the audit would be required to report any immediate animal welfare concerns to the EFC Field Operations Supervisor.

Healthy Farms

Do you know to expect in the event of an OH&S investigation?

Under current legislation, for OH&S to inspect in the event of an incident or complaint, they need to be able to answer yes to the following three questions:

- Are they being paid?
- Are they non-family?
- Did it happen during a farm activity?

The definition of family member for this purpose is related to the shareholder, sole proprietor or partner of the farm and includes spouse, child, parent, grandparent, sibling, aunt, uncle, niece, nephew or first cousin.

Whether or not the investigation is related to a "farm activity" can be difficult to determine. Recently there was an accident during the construction of a grain bin. That may be considered a farming activity, or it may be considered manufacturing or construction. In the most recent case, it was the OH&S officers' decision how to classify the activity.
